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





This consultation includes a calculator that establishes credits and debts for your project. This type of consultation is being piloted in the Salish Sea and then it will be implemented in each corps district office. The pilot program is not going well as ports in the Seattle area are not able to complete it for their projects. From the preserved wood industry, the consultation limits the use of preserved wood products among other things.
